Known to two continents of theatre devotees as Beatrice Lillie, Lady Peel was married to Sir Robert Peel, 5th Baronet, in 1920. Lady Peel was in Canada recently—the bright and particular star in "Oh Please," and these photographs in Martha gowns were taken during her stay in Toronto, the city of her birth. Her father, the late Mr. John Lillie was for twelve years in the Indian Army, and upon retirement came to Canada.

In the oval and upper photograph Lady Peel is wearing a gleaming white taffeta with unusual lattice-like edging of the silk, and an exquisite shoulder line. On the elbow table is a miniature of her husband's great grandfather, who as Prime Minister of England organized the police force, at first called Peelers, then Bobbies, their name to this day.
