Yes, we know him, and memory flashes back to that summer afternoon six years ago when we saw him charging down the home stretch at Hamilton to win the Dominion Plate with Dellahm and the favorite, Woodbine, safely behind him. A great race that, for it was run over a course of one mile and one furlong, which is sufficiently strenuous to test to the full the heart and speed of a racing thoroughbred. Ah, well, for Algonquin, for that is who it is, race-track work is a thing of the past. Today he is a saddle horse; has been for three years, since the time he came into his present ownership, and it must be admitted that he makes an ideal saddle, easy to ride, and with perfect manners. But then all these Uplands Farm horses are well mannered, without exception. And playful! Let one of them loose in the exercise field and away he dashes at top speed, enjoying the sensation of careering over the springy turf. A sudden whistle from an attendant, and though he is in a far corner of the expansive grounds, you see an ear cocked back to register the summons. He stops, wheels and canters back to ascertain the reason for his recall, perhaps also to find out if it does not mean a bit of sugar, or a carrot, or some other dainty dear to the equine palate.

We have already spoken of Mr. Rogers' love for the horse; we should like also to stress his keen desire to promote horsemanship. Towards that worthy end he offered a trophy for competition among officers and ex-officers of the Canadian forces, his action in this respect being prompted by the international contest for the Ferguson challenge cup which annually features the Royal Winter Fair, and which for two successive years has been captured by European Army teams, first the Belgians, second the French. To stimulate interest among our own military horsemen and to bring to light latent talent, he initiated the competition, which is known as the Alfred Rogers Trophy, and constituted the piece de resistance at the Toronto Hunt carnival last April.

The owner of Uplands Farm enjoys riding a horse to-day as much as at any time in his life. His three sons, Alfred, Donald and Guy, are all capable equestrians, the former having ridden with marked success at leading Canadian shows. The stable now is in charge of Stanley Mumford, a horseman of repute, who was with Major Macey of Avon, New York State, for seven years. Mr. Mumford knows a horse from hoof to crest, and is a skilful conditioner of fencing types. He has good material to work on in the horses of Uplands Farm, which perhaps is one of the reasons why both he and his employer are quietly confident that fresh honors await them this Summer and Fall.
