Spray Of Steel Over 100 Men

SHEFFIELD, Wednesday.
SIXTEEN out of a hundred men were burned as they fled from a spray of molten metal which swept an armament workshop here to-day like a flail.

PEACE VIEWS MADE HIS CHURCH POOR

STRONG peace views expressed by the vicar of a Surrey church have caused a split in the congregation and left the church hard up.
The church is that of St. Mary the Virgin at Ewell; the vicar the Rev. G. C. Holland.
"Owing to some of the congregation refusing to support the church because of disagreement with my attitude," he writes, "we shall call an extraordinary parochial meeting to discuss the whole question."
Another Surrey vicar, the Rev. H. M. Scott, of St. John's, Kingston Vale, has resigned from Malden and Combe Borough Council—after seven years.
"In this case it is not a matter of strong views but of lack of time."
"A vicar's only real duty is to his church," he said yesterday. "He cannot afford the time to be a town councillor as well."

Four of them, all employees of the Firth-Vickers Stainless Steel Co., were detained in hospital.

"Molten metal came out of the top and showered far around," one of the men told me.
"Men a hundred yards away were caught and burned as they ran for their lives."
At one time there was a danger of fire, but burning floorboards and sacking were quickly put out.

HOME OFFICE ON GAS MASK TESTS

The Home Office yesterday answered charges made in a London newspaper that the Government's civilian gas masks are, in certain circumstances, ineffective.
There are 40,000,000 of these masks stored in depots throughout the country. They have cost £5,000,000, or 2s. 6d. each.
The Home Office describes the newspaper's allegations as "misleading," and explains—
"Three types of gas masks are manufactured by the Government for use in war.
"The first is known as the service respirator, which is issued to the fighting services, to policemen, fire brigades, decontamination squads, rescue parties and first-aid parties, that is, to persons whose duties might require them to be exposed for long periods to heavy concentrations of lethal or other gases.
"MUCH LIGHTER
"The second is the civilian duty respirator, which has been designed for members of civil air raid precautions services and others who might be called upon to carry out their normal duties in the presence of gas, but who are not likely to be continuously exposed to the highest concentrations.
"This respirator incorporates the same principles as the service respirator, but its canister is lighter and is attached direct to the facepiece.
"The third is the civilian respirator, which is constructed on the same principles as the other two, but is much lighter.
"It is designed to give protection to ordinary members of the public who might be exposed for short periods in the open to gases.
"The essential filters for all respirators which the Government has prepared for use in emergency are manufactured at Government factories or under direct Government supervision.
"REAL QUESTION
"It is a commonplace of knowledge among persons experienced in this work that a certain but small proportion of arsenical smoke will penetrate any type of respirator.
"The real question is whether the wearer of the respirator is likely to be exposed to a sufficient concentration, and for a sufficient period, to make this penetration of practical importance.
"The tests carried out by the newspapers were heavy concentrations of arsenical smoke in a confined gas chamber and not out of doors.
"Such concentrations would not be experienced in the open under war conditions unless the wearer of the respirator deliberately stood over an enemy bomb generating arsenical smoke.
"To suffer the effects which some of the persons in the test are reported to have suffered would mean continuing to stand over such a bomb for anything from four to ten minutes.
"The civilian gas masks for which the Government is responsible are subjected to stringent tests at all stages of manufacture.
"They have been tested against the highest concentrations of gas, including arsenicals, which are likely to be experienced by their wearers under war conditions."


